

Membership Challenge – What's That?

You will be hearing a lot more about the Membership Challenge over the coming months so, what's is the Membership Challenge and how does it involve you? The Membership Challenge is set within the context of the Pro Grand Master's 7 year strategy and is focused on the difference between the membership gains and losses in our Province. It is expressed as a percentage of Initiates. Its purpose is to identify the increase in Initiates required to maintain the status quo or, more importantly, to see our membership numbers increasing year on year.

The key part in this is that every member of the Province can play their part in our Membership Challenge. Why? The Membership Challenge is

not solely focused on Initiates and bringing gentlemen into Freemasonry, that is only one side of the equation. Just as importantly, it is making sure that those gentlemen who become Freemasons are engaged and enjoying their Freemasonry so that they remain members for the long term.

If we do not retain our members then our numbers on the losses side will only increase and negate the good work that's achieved on bringing gentlemen into Freemasonry.

So, what can you do aside from introducing gentlemen, here's some thoughts for you to consider:

- Are your Lodge members enjoying their Freemasonry? We all enjoy different elements of Freemasonry, take time to explain things to the newer members (vou don't need to be their mentor), introduce a Brother to his Light Blues club, take him with you when you visit or involve them in social activities.
- Don't forget to think about your longer standing members, are they still enjoying their Freemasonry? Would they like to do something different?
- Are you leaving it to someone else to check in on members who are not attending? Could you give a Brother who has missed a few meetings a call or pop

in to see him for a cup of tea? Does this Brother need some form of help? Has this Brother lost interest?

As an aside, the Member's Pathway provides the framework to help Lodges grow and thrive and, as such, meet the Province's Membership Challenge. Has your Lodge thought about putting a Lodge Membership team together? This would include the Lodge Membership Officer, Lodge Almoner, Lodge Mentor and similar. Each focused on a different part of the Members' Pathway hub (Plan -Attract - Engage -Retrieve/Retain) To quote the Pro-Grand Master (as I have in a previous article), "I believe every single member can and should be able to contribute to ensuring Freemasonry thrives, both as individuals and within our respective Lodges." Let's work together on building Freemasonry for future Freemasons and let's have fun doina it!

Another busy year with the legacy of the pandemic still being felt by many. Couple this with the increases to the cost of living and many of our Brothers who remain on fixed incomes may find themselves needing to tighten their purse strings in many ways. I urae every Mason to keep an eve on their Brothers for signs of financial or other distress. Together, we can make a difference and offer support where it is most needed. Many of our Brothers feel too proud to admit that they are struggling, especially to someone in their own Lodge. Brothers often don't want to approach their Almoner as he is part of the Lodge. We have had many successes over the past vear with Brothers referring themselves to MCF. This is simple to do and a phone call to 0800 035 60 90 or an email to help@mcf.org.uk immediately opens the door to a world of support for those who qualify. Simply put, qualification for Masonic support means that the applicant must have a current Masonic connection or dependency on a subscribing Mason. For those who have resigned, Masonic support is extended to cover twice the length of time they were a subscribing Mason, so support does not automatically stop when you resign. For most applicants, the second qualifying criteria for arants is a means test with certain parameters applied to current income and amount of savings. Bricks and mortar are not considered as financial assets, it is iust savinas or bonds that are taken into account. Even those

Brethren who are above the thresholds for support often receive good advice on maximising income support from the State

Some MCF services are offered free without any means testing. The Counselling Care Line (CCL) is such a service and can be accessed by emailing the address above and asking to access the CCL. This service has now been extended to include children and has offered a vital life line for many Brothers and their families in this Province.

In the period Apr 22 to Jan 23, MCF has given £161,000 of support to 67 Masons and their families in this Province alone. In addition, the Provincial Grand Charity has given £7,000 to 13 applicants by way of emergency arants. These arants are awarded to Brothers in acute distress and are often an essential boost whilst their application to MCF is being managed, a process that can take up to 12 weeks. The Provincial Grand Charity (PGC) is a hugely beneficial source of immediate funds and I strongly urge you all to continue to support PGC when you are allocating your charitable monies for the year.

On 28 January 2023 we launched



the Giving Time initiative with the RMBI Care Home, Devonshire Court, and our neighbouring Province of Leicestershire and

Rutland. We planned to launch this in 2020, but the project was delayed due to the Pandemic. The idea is to try and achieve 100 hours of support to Devonshire Court from Masons in both Provinces. Your time can be given by: visiting residents, giving talks, participating in activities, helping with gardening and grounds maintenance or any other activity that increases engagement with the residents and staff. More details will be distributed to Lodge Secretaries and Almoners in due course. If just 50 Masons from each Province give an hour of their time over the next 12 months we will have achieved our 100 hour target. Please think about how you might contribute.

Thank you all for your continued support to Almonry in this Province and I wish you all a happy and healthy 2023.

I am pleased to advise we have now prepared new guides for distribution. These are based on a UGLE model tailored to our own Province. The format we use in this Province will therefore match auides

distributed throughout England. The UGLE version is similar in content to our own earlier auides.

In addition to these guides, we have also prepared a separate version covering information particular to our Province, information which is not included within the UGLE based guides. We envisage these Provincial auides will also be distributed with the Initiates guide after the first-degree ceremony.

Finally, to reflect changes to the UGLE members' pathway guidance and mentoring support in our own Province, we will in due course issue a new Mentor's handbook. This handbook will also fit to the new guides distributed after each degree ceremony. Hopefully, the work we can complete over the next few months will provide a solid basis for mentoring support to our members for the next several vears.

With barely a year of our 2024 MCF Festival remaining, we are in the home straight. There is no time to lose if we were to maximise our impact.

So, why should we pull out all the stops to support the MCF through our Festival?

The Provincial Grand Charity does an exceptionally good job in supporting both local Masonic families and charities. Its resources are limited and donations are therefore always greatly appreciated. However, our national Freemasons' charity, the MCF, which last year made grants of £24.4m, is far better placed to meet more demanding needs.

Remember, it is OUR charity - your's and mine.

Last year, nationally, the MCF gave more than £11,358,829 to Freemasons and their families through 3,965 grants. 387 grants were given to local and national charities, totalling £5,409,846.

In this Province, the MCF supported 95 disadvantaged and vulnerable Freemasons or their families with grants totalling £240,145 and made 6 grants to non-Masonic charities totalling £75,373. They have just approved a grant of £21,000 for the Three Pillars Feeding the Homeless charity.

As Freemasons, we and our families all benefit from having the availability of this unstinting MCF support in time of need.

The MCF provides grants to alleviate financial strain faced by∏Freemasons and their families in crisis or distress help for Freemasons and their families to live healthier and more active lives, by funding medical assessments, treatment, and mobility equipment, and support for carers help for young people in education or training to achieve their potential and maximise their talents residential care for older Freemasons and their

Freemasons and their families, mainly through the first class RMBI care homes (with Devonshire Court and Cornwallis Court serving this Province)

a confidential counselling

service (including for the children and grandchildren of Freemasons from the age of five upwards) a free will writing service

A recent recipient of daily living costs support said:

"Our pensions are not enough to cover our costs and, because we are not eligible for Pension





Credit, we were anxious about what could happen. However, the MCF has really put us at ease this year by providing us with a grant to cover some of our daily living expenses."



The MCF is well aware of the growing cost-of-living crisis and exploring ways to provide extra help to those hardest hit.

All this potential assistance is available to you and your families

through your Lodge Almoner, the Provincial Grand Almoner or by ringing the MCF directly

To help alleviate the hardship it caused, the MCF awarded £4.7 million in grants to support local communities through COVID-19.

On behalf of Freemasonry, the MCF reacted within days of the invasion of Ukraine with a grant of £50,000 to the British Red Cross. A fundraising appeal within Freemasonry, spearheaded by the MCF, raised a further £500,000 within days with funds allocated to support the work of aid agencies working in the affected areas, as well as initiatives and projects in England and Wales.

On our behalf, the MCF is acting as a force for good in the wider society by supporting local and community causes.

At its conclusion (the end of March 2024) we can then be justifiably proud we have truly played our part in supporting our national charity which will always be there to support us.

What's in a number as two Lodges Celebrate

Two Lodges, seperated by one digit, consecurated on the same day, celebrated their Centenaries in 2022.

Firstly, The Centenary meeting of Waynflete Lodge No. 4452 was held on Wednesday the 19th of October 2022, at The Town Hall, Brackley, and on Saturday 26th November 2022, St Wilfrid Lodge No 4453 met at The Ellindon Masonic Centre, Peterborough.As expected, both proved to be wonderful occasions.

On taking the Chair and presiding over both

ceremonies, The PGM congratulated Wayneflete, not only on being consecrated 100 years ago, but on keeping the Lodge going over that period, which was a remarkable feat considering everything that has happened in that time. On his address at St Wilfrid, he likened their namesake's pilgrimage to Rome to the

proceedings before, after, and during a Lodge meeting and the Festive Board, He also reminded The Brethren that Waynflete Lodge, were number 4452, one number below St Wilfrid and had their warrant issued on the same day - not many Provinces could boast this statistic!

The Provincial Grand Chaplain, WBro. Aaron Day, provided an oration reminding those present at both meetings of events that have occurred during the 100 years since the consecration of the lodge including: 5 Monarchs; 12 PGMs; 22 Prime Ministers; 72 further lodges consecrated in the Province; 6 Grand Masters with the Duke of Kent being one for 55 years of those 100 years.

The history of Wayneflete was presented on the night by W.Bro Michael Genner, Past Provincial Grand Registrar, and that of St Wilfrid by W.Bro Steven

Finally, the PGM presented Centenary certificates and jewels to W.Bro David Goshorn, Worshipful Master of Wayneflete, and W.Bro Michael Ross, WM of St Wilfrid, before those present on both occasions retired for two very enjoyable Festive Boards.



A Daily Advancement

The 1723 Constitutions brought into focus

To celebrate the tercentenary of the 1723 Constitutions of Freemasonry, a year-long free exhibition has now opened at the Museum of Freemasonry in London, which will be accompanied by national and international events.

Under the banner of '1723 – Inventing the Future', the exhibition features digital displays and items from the collections that have never previously been on public display.



Among them are a personal copy of the Constitutions belonging to John, the second Duke of Montagu, the first noble Grand Master: the box that contained the Duke of Richmond's miniature working tools; a maul purportedly belonging to Sir Christopher Wren; and a host of rare early and mid-18th-century items relating to Freemasonry and the

Enlightenment.

Richard Berman, PhD, FRHistS, said: "The 1723 Constitutions was based on **Enlightenment** foundations, values that lie at the core of modern Freemasonry in England and internationally. The Constitutions set a pattern for Freemasonry throughout the

world. Understanding the context helps to explain the origins of modern Freemasonry and sheds light on the relationship between Freemasonry and society today."

In addition to the exhibition, a dedicated website (see bottom of page) which provides a comprehensive picture of the context, content and consequences of this remarkable book.

There is a local connection to the Book from this

Province. Boughton House in Northamptonshire was the family home of The Montagues - the present house being built by Ralph Montagu, 1st Duke of Montagu. Ralph's son, John, was born in 1690. At the age of 15 was married to Mary Churchill, daughter of the Duke of Marlborough.

In 1709 he succeeded his father as Master of the Great Wardrobe on his father's demise.

He subsequently became a professional soldier and saw active service in Spain in 1709 to 1711. He continued to serve for several years, eventually being promoted to General in 1745, the year of the Jacobite rebellion, when he raised a foot company and a cavalry Regiment to fight the Scots. They were disbanded after the Battle of Culloden in 1746

In 1717 he was admitted a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and in 1718 he was elected Fellow of the Royal Society and made a Knight of the Garter, then in 1725 was made a Knight Companion of the Order of the Bath. He was one of the supporters and a founding governor of the Foundling Hospital in London in 1739.

John was also responsible for extending and laying out the gardens at Boughton House as a miniature Versailles.

His town house was Montagu House in Bloomsbury. This property was bought by the government following his death to hold the national collection of antiques, and on the site was built the British Museum. John Montagu is buried in St Edmund's Church, Warkton, Nr Kettering where there is an impressive monument erected to his memory.

However, John, the Second Duke of Montagu had held another position – that of Grand Master of the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons – in which he was installed on 24th June 1721 at Stationers' Hall.

He was the first nobleman to serve as Grand Master, and as you can see, he was a powerful and wealthy man – just the person the new Grand Lodge needed to increase its popularity.

In September 1721 it is recorded that, finding fault with all the old constitutions, he ordered James Anderson to produce a new version – and the first Book of Constitutions was published in 1723.

PSA Testing in this Province

On behalf of the Grand Superintendent and The Royal Arch Province of Northamptonshire & Huntingdonshire, we would like to give advance notice that, again, all Masons, both Companions and Brethren will be invited to attend one of three PSA testing events in our Province over the coming months. Once again, to be held at the Northampton (see report below), Peterborough and Corby Masonic Centres.

This will be jointly funded once more by the Craft and the Royal Arch, and every member in the Province will receive a letter in the

141 Companions & Brethren recently attended Sheaf Close for a simple blood test. The Graham Fulford Trust who carry out the tests have since confirmed 4 "Red Letters" were issued, recommending the recipients to seek further medical screening for Prostate Cancer.

The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent commented, "Over the years that this P.S.A. Screening programme has been organised by the coming weeks which will explain the booking procedure and the dates of the sessions.

Further sessions this spring are booked for Peterborough – 4th February and Corby – 1st April.

Companions and Brethren living in those areas will receive notification near to the events.

They openly admit that this early intervention may well have saved their lives and we thank the Craft who now financially support the scheme enabling us to organise the screening programme on an annual rather than a bi-annual basis."

Initiation to Exaltation with that Added-Value-Proposition

Just over 210 years ago the Act of Union of the two Grand Lodges declared in the Preliminary Declaration for the Government of the Craft, as stated in the Book of Constitutions, that we all have that Pathway consisting of the four stages/four phases in our own Journey in Pure Antient Freemasonry - namely our Initiation, Passing, Raising and our Exaltation into the Royal Arch. Only then have we truly completed our Journey in Pure Antient Freemasonry, and only then can we be free to explore other avenues or areas in Masonry.

This guidance in the Pathway across the Craft and culminatina in the Royal Arch was emphasised by the Grand Master and First Grand Principal at Supreme Grand Chapter (SGC) in April 2021; further highlighted by the Pro Grand First Principal at SGC in November 2021; then again by the new Pro Grand First Principal at SGC in November 2022; and vet again by the Pro Grand Master at Quarterly Communications of UGLE in December 2022, where it is now engrained within the launch of the new seven-year strategy for both the Craft and the Royal Arch.

In recent years it has been further emphasised that we have all been charged with the task of ensuring that all candidates for Freemasonry are informed, at their interview stage, of the four stages/four phases that await them in their Journey in Pure Antient Freemasonry.

We now see from the new Members Pathway seven-year strategy launched in December

2022 that such a Journey with its four elements is regarded as the norm for those coming into our fraternity giving greater emphasis of the planned level of development that waits them with many of the joys and delights, as well as the surprises that await them as they progress along their own Masonic Pathway. In all of this it needs to be clear that the Journey is made up of these four parts and that much more awaits the candidate to further ensure they are engaged, welcomed, and cared for as they progress to greater heights and (again) delights in Freemasonry.

The initial 'proposition' of Learning - Education -Development within the framework of Initiation - Passing - Raising - Exaltation was originally enough and has been in place for many years. But in 2015 UGLE and SGC realised that they needed to gain a more in-depth understanding of what members really wanted and what were the priorities for Brethren and Companions as they progressed through their own Personal Masonic Journey. It was clear from the survey, which was undertaken in October 2015. that Brethren and Companions really desired for a greater understanding, knowledge, and information about Freemasonry, and with this being the most significant factor for Companions in the Royal Arch.

From this, work was then started on the construction what is now known as Solomon at solomon.ugle.org.uk, with the aim that Solomon would be the world-leading repository for Masonic knowledge and information. After much work in development and collating materials Solomon was launched in November 2018. Since then.

Solomon has grown and extended its on-line materials and offerings to what we see today, with an array of information covering all the stages from the Entered Apprentice to the Fellowcraft and Master Mason, and further on to the Exaltee in the Royal Arch. The Solomon initiative has now to be recognised as an additional, if not the finalised. 'proposition' for Brethren and Companions. The Solomon resource is something that money-could-not-buy as no unit. whether an individual Lodge or Chapter, Province or District, could afford the cost of constructing such an on-line 'proposition'.

For those who have yet to register with Solomon the process is easy! After logging on to the Solomon website you will see two 'module-links' to 'Getting Started with Solomon' and 'Discover Freemasonry', Here can be found the array of materials and especially the presentation videos in 'Solomon Live' which have been broadcast recently, and which can now be viewed at your leisure and at a convenient time for you as you relax and head in to the new 2023 season
