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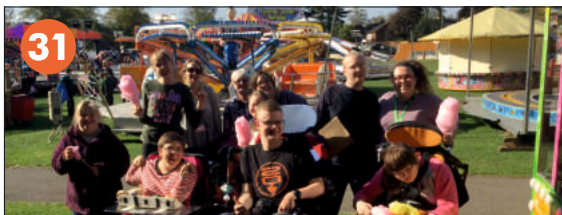
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Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

I hope that everyone enjoyed a happy festive season and we can now look forward to the New Year. I wish you all happiness and prosperity.

We have an interesting year ahead. We progress with our 2024 Festival which has witnessed an amazing start. It is so important that as many brethren as possible support this Festival and I know that all Lodge Charity Stewards are working very hard. I am confident that we will achieve our target and, hopefully, exceed it, so that we can demonstrate our support of the Masonic Charity Foundation.

The Retention and Retrieval Scheme headed by W.Bro David Watson is already beginning to have an effect. You all know that it is my wish to increase our membership numbers

after decades of decline and I believe that retention and retrieval will have a dramatic effect on our numbers. We must, of course, continue to bring new members into our Order and I know that most Lodges are meeting with success in this area. As I travel around our Province, I notice that there are large numbers of young men that are joining us and I firmly believe that young men who enjoy what Freemasonry provides will persuade their friends to join us also. I must say that I am more confident about the future of our organisation that I have ever been before.

Grand Lodge has introduced the Pathway which has been adopted by the Province and is proving quite useful. There will be further support information issued by Grand Lodge and our



Membership Officer, W.Bro John Fergusson, will use this as we think fit. The most recent introduction has been something called Solomon. This is an app which provides much guidance for members on an array of Masonic subjects and I recommend its use to all members.

One area that is of much concern for a lot of Provinces is the matter of buildings. I hear of situations where buildings are now over a hundred years old and are costing more and more to maintain and that is with, often, a declining membership. I am very relieved to say that we do not have any problems in this area. Northampton

Freemasonry is now happily ensconced at Sheaf Close and Huntingdon Masons now enjoy the benefits of the new building at Sovereign Court. Our centres at Stamford, Corby and Wellingborough have all benefited from loans from the Provincial Building Fund and the other centres are all well maintained and managed and cause no concern. I congratulate the teams at these centres who ensure that we can all practise our Freemasonry in pleasant and comfortable surroundings.

This year will mark a very significant event for our Province. Pomfret Lodge holds a warrant dated 16th

October 1819 and, therefore, we will be celebrating the Bicentenary of this, the oldest Lodge in the Province. During its existence Pomfret has been the progenitor of 93 other Lodges in neighbouring Provinces as well as our own. There will be four special meetings during 2019 – the Installation in January of W.Bro Mark Charteress, a Banner Rededication Ceremony in February and then, in April, a meeting to which members of all 93 progeny Lodges will be invited. Finally, in November there will be a UGLE Executive visit to present the 200-year certificate. In addition to this October will mark the centenary meeting of

Dr Oliver Lodge in Peterborough, so we have some very important business to enjoy during 2019.

Brethren, I know that we have a vibrant and successful Province and I am extremely privileged to be its Provincial Grand Master. I look forward to being with you all at the various events that will take place and on my visits to your Lodges.

Some centres already operate a form of newer

Masons group and I am aware others are also now developing new 'light blue clubs', which is to be encouraged.

W.Bro Mark Constant is also leading an initiative to ensure we have a coherent and workable arrangement across the Province by establishing a new overarching organisation, The Provincial New & Young Masons Club. Every centre has the opportunity to create a newer member social or 'light blue' group with full Provincial support. I believe given the right help and framework, every centre will greatly benefit from the establishment of such groups. Mark and I do however invite anyone interested in new masons' groups to contact me on my email address below.

Since the last edition, a number of initiatives are now progressing. The Provincial website includes a Mentors forum which is now fully operational and includes a number of

discussion subjects. I would urge all Lodge Mentors and others with a desire to promote best practice, to visit the website and add their observations.

Elsewhere in this edition, the implementation of the Membership Pathway and access to the new Solomon.ugle.org.uk online learning resource are both highlighted. The Provincial Membership Officer John Ferguson and I are keen to develop good practice within Lodges. We remain available to support and assist Lodges to ensure every Mason has an enjoyable and fulfilling introduction and development through their Craft career and within The Holy Royal Arch.



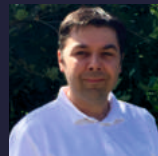
News From Provincial Grand Lodge

Some 80 Lodges were represented at our recent Almoner Association briefings held November and December 2018.

We had a packed agenda of topics that focussed on how we can improve on the wonderful work our Almoners do.

The post-meeting evaluation forms completed by most attendees indicate the importance of the Association. 98% felt the organisation of the event, the venues and facilities were either good or excellent. Similarly, some 92% felt the content of the sessions and its

presentation was of good or excellent quality. Impressively, 85% of attendees felt that the briefings improved their ability to perform their roles as Almoners.

The key messages from our briefings are listed here.

Key Messages

Demand for support continues to rise by around 25% on previous years

We must look for ways to create awareness of the support available and how to access it through regular communication with Members, Widows, ex-members and their families

Demand for support from elderly members and their families is increasing and we must be ready to meet their needs

The Lodge Almoner will play an important role in the Province's Membership Retention Campaign – make sure you are booked to attend one of the seminars planned in 2019



2024 MCF Festival Update

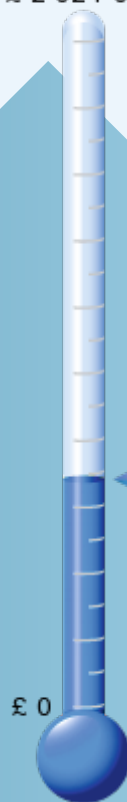

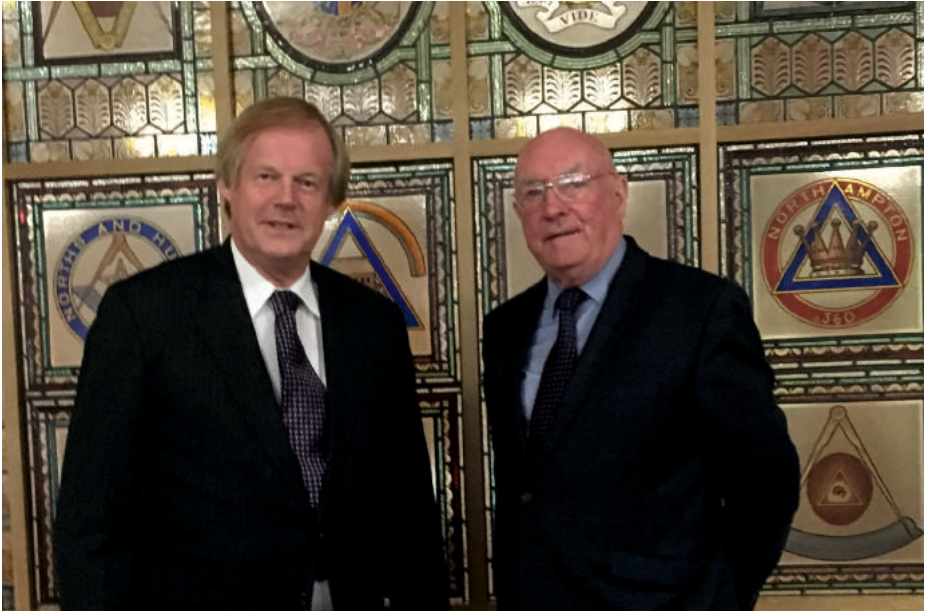

A Very Special Surprise Visitor at Sheaf Close

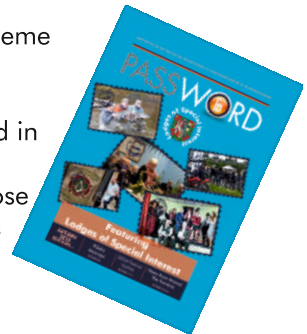

Waynflete Lodge Returns Home

Waynflete Lodge returned to its home at the Brackley Town Hall last September.

The Lodge takes its name from William Waynflete who came originally from Wainfleet in Lincolnshire who became Bishop Waynflete. Started by Oxford and Buckinghamshire masons living and working in Brackley the lodge was consecrated on the 11th of October 1922 at the Brackley Town Hall.

Meetings were held in the Hall until two years ago when a £2m refurbishment started and they transferred to the Crown Hotel.

On the 19th of September 2018 to

great relief of the Brethren meetings returned to the Town Hall with thirty three in attendance.

The Brackley Town Hall refurbishment was funded by a grant of over £2 million, it has seen everything inspected and repaired or replaced. A new lift, staircase and stained glass windows have been re-introduced which now include a design by Bro David Parsons showing the Lodge name and Masonic symbols. As the longest commercial user of



the building and having considerable storage requirements, the Lodge was consulted regarding the refurbishment and as a result furniture is now stored at the working floor level in a purpose built facility so that it is a relatively simple operation to setup and store, previously they were major exercises.

Palmer Court Needs Your Help

Palmer Court was founded by RW Bro Peter Palmer in 1984 and is a sheltered housing scheme for those who can live independent lives, located in the Hatton Park area of Wellingborough which provides residential accommodation for both Masons and non-Masons aged 60 or over or 55 for those registered as disabled.

The Scheme is managed by an on site Manager and Deputy, and is supported by a voluntary House Committee of local Masons who bring expertise from many specialities including accountancy, engineering and surveying to help provide the highest standard of voluntary care for our local community.

The site comprises of 14 flats, which are well suited to individual occupancy, and 21 apartments that are better suited for couples and to help relatives and friends visit our Residents we have a twin-bedded guest room available.

Although Palmer Court is a lovely building with its recent extension opened in 2014, the original building is aging and in need of continual refurbishment, we have recently completed the refurbishment of our communal lounge with a new lighting scheme, carpets and additional furniture, we have also continued to improve our garden and patio

areas providing more useful space for our Residents to sit and



enjoy a very pleasant atmosphere on a warm and sunny afternoon.

Every year, at Christmas time, the Provincial Grand Charity

makes a donation to Palmer Court and on this occasion W.Bro Jerry Higgins, a Trustee of the charity, was selected to present a cheque for £1200.

The picture shows W.Bro Jerry handing over the cheque to W.Bro Ian Richards, Chairman of Palmer Court with W.Bro John Rivett, Secretary to the Provincial Grand Charity and Mrs Jill Lett, the Scheme Manager looking on. In addressing the residents, W.Bro Higgins explained "the money will be used to provide some extra cheer for the Festive Season"

This is achieved by giving each of them a cash bonus, with any remainder being put towards a Christmas party to which friends

and family are invited.

Although the rents go a long way towards the day to day running of the home, it is the extra donations such as this and those from various Lodges, that give Palmer Court the edge over the other schemes in the area.

The 3 Pillars Trust take delivery of new vehicle

During January, The 3 Pillars – Feeding The Homeless charity, took delivery of their new vehicle adapted specially for their purpose.

In addition, it has been liveried with signage to let the world know, `Freemasonry in the Community` is working right where it matters ! The charity was first set up in August 2016 by W.Bro Mick Pescod and W.Bro

Ged Dempsey and was so named to identify it with Freemasonry and its principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

The idea was to set up a feeding station for the homeless of Peterborough and provide food, clothing, tents, sleeping bags and toiletries to the poor and distressed in our Province. It was soon established that there was a real

need for this service, and for Freemasonry to make a valuable contribution to the community.

The support of The Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro Max Bayes has been invaluable and a significant driver for the development of the project.

They have now established important links and support from other organisations to help `break the circle`, including the YMCA ; Operation Farmington - supporting homeless just released from prison; Amicus - housing veterans; Outside links - part of HMP Prison and drop in centre; The Hope Project, and



also Independent Domestic Violence Agency (IDVA)

With the acquisition of the new van, this means that their plan to expand the project to more locations within the Province of Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire is happening, starting with Wellingborough taking the old van to set up there, with Brothers Dan Cooke and Matt Horton taking this forward with a growing team of volunteers. . Further areas to expand into are Corby and Northampton, and any other areas where there is a need.

Other Provinces have

expressed interest in the project and we have received great backing from The Deputy President of the Masonic Charitable Foundation, VW.Bro James Newman.

The ultimate vision is that it may be possible in the future to utilise empty office blocks, to fit them out and staff them to make a contribution in response to the year on year increase of persons who are homeless. The charity have certainly put 'Freemasonry in the Community' and shown that Masonry is a fraternity that wants to engage with the community in a practical and



meaningful way.

Many of the volunteers are in fact not Masons, but being involved has brought Freemasonry into their lives and also that of the wider public. The response and support have been overwhelming.

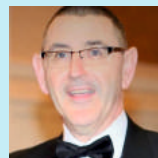


News From Around The Province

April 4th 2019 –

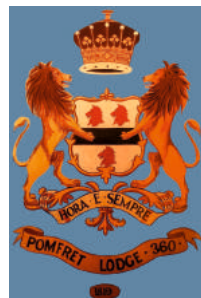

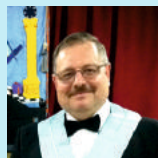

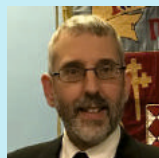

ethnicity, religion or ability to pay. It treats approximately 140,000 patients and carries out about 5,000 operations every year.
