Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

Our Lodge Mentors and Almoners carry the main load in this regard, but we are all responsible and equally Mentors and Almoners. If we work at both ends to build interest and initiate more good men whilst retaining and keeping the gates closed to Brethren drifting away, we will meet our growth targets I am sure.

As we have now entered



2024, our MCF Festival is drawing to a close and I am delighted to say we have reached our target set of £2,024,000 and so discharged our duty. I thank and congratulate you all, but especially I must thank our hard working Provincial Grand Charity Steward WBro Gerry Crawford who has successfully led our fundraising campaign throughout this Festival. Also many thanks to those who

have abseiled, walked, cycled, and done all manner of things to raise money during the Festival and I look forward to properly acknowledging everyone at Provincial Grand Lodge in May 2024 when we unveil our final total.

I must however mention that during those 7 years we have received over £2,128,000 in grants and donations to our members and charities within Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire, not to mention the similar amount pro rata for the 5 years



preceding the Festival, meaning we have received much more from the MCF, than we are paying back during this Festival period. I do therefore feel we still owe the MCF something in addition to our target figure, to help us repay the support members of our Province and community have received over the last 7 years.

As such, I urge every Lodge to consider giving a little more to the Festival so we can hold our heads up as a Province which makes a positive contribution to, rather than being recipients of, the Masonic Charitable Foundation. With substantial funds remaining in Lodge relief chests across our 97 Lodges, I am sure we can do a little more, and so ask for those who do have balances in their relief chests, to free up some of these funds and make a further donation to the Festival Appeal in these last closing months. In real terms a balance in a bank account doesn't help or assist anyone, and we raise the money to be charitable. not to accumulate wealth. Also any good our funds can do, is always eroded by time and inflation, so funds collected now should be dispersed now in order that they can be the most effective and obtain the best value for the recipients.

It has been a great honour and privilege to have been your Provincial Grand Master over the last 18 months, the enthusiasm and energy shown towards our Membership Challenge has been exceptional and the work and commitment by members towards reaching our Festival target has also been superb. I see ritual improving across the Province, the average age of members reducing, membership numbers increasing and everyone having fun and enjoying their Freemasonry. Long may this continue, I thank you all for your commitment and support.

I look forward to being with you in our various Lodges across this wonderful Province very soon.

However, now is not the time to draw down the shutters. As they say, it is not over until the rotund lady sings. There is still more we can do.

We have responded magnificently to the challenge of the Festival in



difficult times. Despite a snow storm making local roads impassable, it was successfully launched on 2 March 2018 at Peterborough and the following evening in Northampton. The last six years has seen significant challenges with many potential obstacles to us

achievina our taraet. As we were getting into our fundraising stride, Covid struck. This led to the suspension of face-to-face Masonic activity for over a year and the subsequent loss of events and other opportunities for fundraising. There have also been general economic problems with sharp inflation rate rises, putting more pressure on household finances and the scope of members for charitable aiving. Fewer members have been able to support our charitable aims.

Regular Payment Promises continue to raise the bulk of our donations.
Contributions have also come from a multitude of fundraising events. Some, who perhaps have not been able to donate financially, have supported the overall effort by giving their time in supporting various events. I sincerely thank all who have

contributed in whatever way





or through organising, taking part in or supporting fundraising events.

I repeat, the Festival is not yet over. We still have a few weeks left in which we can really make a difference by making sure we raise as great a sum as possible for the MCF. If your Lodge has reached its target, why should it now go the extra mile in making any further contribution? Why should you, as an individual, consider making an extra donation?

Well, the MCF is OUR national charity your's and mine.





Every day, in Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire, 24/7, 365 days a year, in or out of Festival, it is supporting Masonic families as well as non-Masonic charities in our area.

Since the start of the Festival, the MCF has supported Masonic families in this Province with grants totalling about £2,000,000.

The MCF is currently supporting 13 non-Masonic charities across the Province with grants totalling of £128,322. For example

- Thomas's Fund, which provides music therapy across Northamptonshire for children with life-limiting illnesses has benefitted from MCF funded management consultancy support from Cranfield School of Management, greatly aiding the management of the charity
- The 3 Pillars Feeding the Homeless charity has received a grant of £21,500, helping sustain the growing demand for its services
- The Eve Family Refuge has received £59,000 helping them to support more women and children affected by domestic abuse in Northamptonshire
- Volunteer Action has received £15,000 enabling



them to enhance their community transport and befriending services in East Northants (see page 25) These are just a few examples there are many more.



As Masons, we can all be proud this all-embracing support is always there for us and our families, as well as enhancing the lives of countless numbers in our local communities. The MCF also offers us other services such as a free confidential counselling and will writing services.

The Provincial Grand Master has made a final Festival appeal (see page 2). He asks that, where any Lodge still has funds in its Relief Chest that have been contributed for the Festival, these be paid into the Festival without delay.

The final Festival total will be announced at Provincial Grand Lodge on 16 May 2024. Let's make it one of which we can all be proud, safe in the knowledge we have pulled out all the stops. By everyone playing their part, we can ensure the song that the lady sings is 'Congratulations.'

This is my last Password article as Provincial Grand Charity Steward (after that pun you may say, thank goodness). I am stepping down at Provincial Grand Lodae. What an honour it has been serving the Province. I offer my grateful thanks to Lodge Charity Stewards (and those supporting them) with whom I have had the privilege of working over the past 11 years. You have worked to uphold the finest traditions of Masonic charity of which we should all be so proud.

It is with great sadness that we confirm the passing of W Bro Neville Hugh Manning PAGDC PProvGDC to the Grand Lodge Above on November 5th 2023 aged 85 years. WBro Neville was initiated into Eleanor Cross Lodge No.1764 on 12 December 1980, becoming Master in 1990. He served for many years as Director of Ceremonies and became Master again in 2011. The former Northampton Saints rugby player, was also

a founder of Webb Ellis Lodge No.9740.

Neville was born in Milton Malsor, educated at Towcester Grammar School and served in the Royal Marines before becoming a building society manager. He was married to Denise with whom he had two daughters.

Commenting on a long and illustrious career in Freemasonry, WBro William Diggins, Provincial Grand Secretary, said "Neville was a man of great honour and dedication, leaving an indelible mark on our

Freemason community. His commitment to our principles was evident during his six-year tenure as the Provincial Director of Ceremonies from 2000 to 2006. His leadership and service have left an enduring legacy that will be remembered by all who had the privilege of knowing him."



With 2023 membership challenge data freshly in (see opposite) we are confident that the positive message of our Fraternity is making real headway – thanks to all those Centres, Lodges and Brethren who have been working so hard since June to produce Open Days, hold Discover Freemasonry events in our communities, supporting the RBL Poppy Appeal and putting on

Information Evenings throughout our Province - Brethren, your efforts are working... 2023 saw 169 new Brethren Initiated seeing Lodges rise to meet the Membership Challenge in the very best ways. We have witnessed sea changes in positivity and thinking - seen several triple and double Initiation ceremonies bringing new members on board in innovative ways combatting traditional problems that all Lodges faced historically - how to grow quickly enough to meet demand... How to respectfully and considerately bring the influx of new men into our organisation

is a problem all Lodges faced in their past - one need only look at post war meeting minutes to see how they innovated then with either multiple candidates or often multiple degree ceremonies being conducted in one night! I'm proud of the way our Lodges are rising to their modern challenges. But, we must not rest... we must continue to achieve great strides in meeting our membership challenge - with all our efforts 2023 ended with an increase of 38 members after 169 initiates, 55 joiners, etc... - great news but not a lot to show from 224 additions - why? 57 deaths, 20 cessation/exclusions, 3 honorary,

and 106 resignations eroded this great work, showing the importance of understanding our weaknesses as well as growing our strengths. With an ageing membership it's inevitable that we will lose some dear friends along the way but we must fight harder in their memory. The average age at death was 83 – we salute these worthy masons for the longevity of their commitment. So, in their memory, we work harder to answer the growing call from the younger generation to Discover Freemasonry, boost Attraction & showcase Freemasonry with stands & volunteering at local events, we show the public how we have fun serving others, we strive further to innovate in producing ceremonies to respond to growing enquiries, we continue Engaging our membership, and, most importantly, we enjoy all we do. Thank you Brethren - I look forward to supporting you with your Discover Freemasonry events at a local show near you very soon... contact me ASAP to find out how

Failure to do so will increase the risk that we lose some of these brethren to resignation within the critical three year period from initiation. Our LMO

As my tenure as PGA comes to a close, I wish W.Bro Greg Warman every success when he is officially appointed as my successor on 16 May 24 2024. Unfortunately my own health has suffered this last year which necessitated my early retirement from my Provincial office and W.Bro Greg has stepped in to support me when needed, indeed he is functioning as PGA as I write this.

The themes for Almoner and welfare support within the Province remain fairly constant. We get a lot of enquiries about long-term health and social care for Masons and their families. Normally, MCF does not fund such care as this is in the hands of local authorities and social services who have a duty of care to keep people safe as they become less able to live independently. The exception to this is if a Brother or qualifying family member wishes to move into an RMBI care home such as Devonshire Court. This is still means-tested and requires personal contribution, but if the money runs out MCF steps in and looks after you for as long as needed.

The other big theme is financial hardship. We have supported a number of Brothers who found themselves short of funds, often through no fault of their own. If an acute distress has caused this change in circumstances

and provided that the Brother garees to a financial assessment, help can be made available through the Provincial Grand Charity in the short-term and MCF in the longer term. If there is a clear need, financial assistance can be given fairly quickly but in order to ensure that charitable money is used appropriately we do need quite a lot of information to support any such applications. My plea to any Brother thinking of referring someone into the Almoner team is to think before you phone. A simple 'Bert needs help, what can we do?' raises more questions than it answers. In my world of healthcare we use an acronym ISBARD to assist communication and I urge you all to think about this when you phone for help or advice

Identification. Brother x initiated xxxx member of xx Lodges

Situation. A description of the need or distress.

Background. Any information that will inform the background to the situation. Includes any assistance the Lodge has offered or is considering.

Assessment. A brief overview of finances, cash savings and monthly income versus expenditure. Does not need to be comprehensive, but if there are significant savings and/or ready capital the petitioner may not qualify for support.

Recommendation. What are

you actually asking for and what do you think is needed.

Decision. This is made at the end of the conversation between the caller and the member of the Almoner Team.

If we all thought about ISBARD, it would save a lot of time and effort and ultimately speed up access to support when it is needed.

Finally, thank you to everyone who has supported me during my tenure I have learned a lot and met some fantastic friends along the way as well as managing the distribution of well over £1M of welfare support to our Brethren and their families. Again, my sincere and fraternal best wishes to W.Bro Greg (telephone 07591 177440) as he takes over this pivotal and demanding role.

News From the Supreme Degree of the Royal Arch

Message from The Grand Superintendent

Dear Companions,

By the time you read this we will be well into 2024. however, as I begin to muse over the content of this article it is still mid way between Christmas and New Year. Looking back at the previous edition of Password Lsomehow feel that I could adopt the strateay used by those who sit in the Houses of Parliament, 'I refer my Honourable Colleagues to my previous statement', for on reading through my article in that edition I feel the message is as relevant now as it was then. However, I guess that that will simply not do! So what else has happened since the Autumn 23 edition. 
News From the Supreme Degree of the Royal Arch

Every Master Mason needs a helping hand to join the Royal Arch

As a Master Mason you are entitled to become a member of the Royal Arch (or Chapter). Chapter is the fourth step in the journey that began with your Initiation.

Becoming a member of the Royal Arch – a Royal Arch Companion – will, of course. entail an additional commitment on your part. There will be meetings to attend and should you take office or wish to take part in ceremonies, there may be ritual to learn and practices to attend - much as with your Craft Masonry. It is essential, therefore, that you consider a number of factors before taking the plunge.

First amongst these should be timing. When is the right time for you to join? What are your other commitments? Have you fully assimilated your experiences from the Craft degrees?





COST: As with the Craft, there is an annual subscription for Chapter membership. Annual subscriptions for Royal Arch Chapters in this Province are between £20.00 and around £55.00 and will depend on the Centre in which the Chapter meets. Dining, of course, is in addition and will also depend on the Centre in which you meet.

LOCATION: It may be that you joined a Craft Lodge near to where you work and would prefer to join a Chapter closer to home – or vice versa. Consider joining a Chapter where the location works best for you.



MEETING DAY: Our Chapters hold either three or four meetings each Masonic season. There are likely to be days of the week and months of the year where you have the time available to attend Chapter. It is at least as likely – if not more likely – that there will be days/months on and in which you cannot afford the time to attend Chapter meetings. You will want to choose a Chapter that meets when you have the time available.

FRIENDS: Do you want to expand your circle of Masonic contacts? If so, you may wish to seek-out a Chapter where you will make new friends and companions. If you are happy to join a Chapter with Brethren from your Craft Lodge, then naturally they will be delighted to welcome you too. Of course, once a Royal Arch Companion, you are able to visit other Chapters too - just as you are able to visit other Craft Lodges right now.



PROGRESSION: As with the Craft, we have a number of officer posts in Royal Arch Chapters. Some of these are progressive, others non-progressive. If you are progressing through the Craft offices, or have a significant role in a Craft lodge such that you have limited bandwidth to learn further ritual, you may want to consider joining a Chapter where you will not be asked to join the progression as soon as you become a member. At the very least, you would want it known that you do not wish to join the progression at an early point in your membership. Alternatively, it may be that you do have the bandwidth and would relish the opportunity to join the progression early in your new Chapter and fully immerse yourself in the ritual. Either way, you should seek out a Chapter that will recognise and meet your aspirations.

There are 27 working Chapters in the Province, spread across the different Centres. All of which will offer you a welcoming hand to continue your journey in pure Antient Freemasonry and complete that fourth step from Initiation to Exaltation. The important thing is to take that step when you are ready to do so, so that you can gain the greatest joy, and experience what is widely acknowledged to be the most dramatic ceremony in Masonry.

Northampton LAMs and fifty years later we are still going strong. Many of the inaugural members are, sadly, no longer with us, but their legacy lives on and we do our best to ensure their values and hopes for the organisation are neither forgotten nor diminished by time.

What started out as a simple social club, which provided an opportunity for family members of Masons to meet regularly, steadily grew and flourished. Companionship and shared interests were the drivers in those early years. Later, with more and more members joining, Northampton LAMs took the form of a 'not for profit' organisation. During those initial years, the Constitution was formed, objectives were set, and officers appointed.

Constitutionally, the main objective of Northampton

LAMs was to arrange social activities for its membership and through this objective to raise funds towards the upkeep and maintenance of Freemasons' Hall. Northampton. This objective has withstood the test of time. as it remains our main objective today. In addition to this, a proportion of monies raised by Members is still donated to outside charities and deserving causes. During our 50 years, we are proud to have accomplished so much and provided funds to enhance and enrich the Northampton Hall premises, supporting Masons in the good works they do. Helpina to change lives Throughout our history, we have championed a wide variety of charitable causes. our second constitutional objective. We chose charities that were dear to our hearts and locally based, where possible. We have listened to many representatives of those charities over the years and are proud to have helped deliver meaningful change to people's lives.

The road ahead

Of course, whilst we were excited to look back and celebrate those 50 years, our imperative now must be to look forward. Despite a diminishing membership, we are determined to maintain, and build upon, our past achievements.

To do this, we need new members to join us on our journey and help shape the next 50 years.

Becoming a member does not mean being expected to attend every coffee morning, lunch, or event, although we would be delighted to see you; your annual subscriptions alone would help us to continue meeting our objectives. It is an opportunity to be a part of something truly worthwhile. In short, you can make a difference and help us build on what our inaugural members set out to do fifty years ago.

We are always pleased to welcome new members, including 'Friends' of LAMs, and we would urge all ladies with an interest in supporting Freemasonry to join us in this very worthy cause and enjoyable experience.
