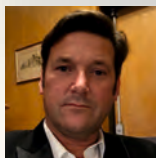


they consider any other order.

We send congratulations and best wishes to all in their new roles.

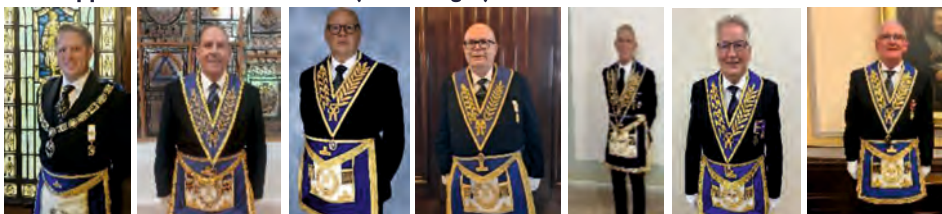

Introducing our Wardens

W.Bro Tim Fussell **Provincial Senior Grand Warden**

Was born in Sutton Coldfield on 26th November 1960, but was brought up in Somerset. After graduating from the London School of Economics, he trained and qualified as a Chartered Accountant in 1986 and then as a member of the Institute of Tax. After 8 years with Ernst and Young he became a partner with Baker Tilly, now RSM and headed up their London corporate tax team. In 2014 he joined Moore Stephens, London office, as national head of corporate tax. He retired in 2019 following the firm's merger with BDO.

Tim became a Freemason in 1993 following in the footsteps of his father and maternal grandfather. He was initiated

into Socrates Lodge 373 and became Master in 2005. He was promoted to the active rank of Provincial Grand Steward in 2007. He was master of Plaisterers' Lodge 7390 (a city of London Livery Lodge) in 2023. He is currently Master of St Wilfrid Lodge 4453 and a member of Northants and Hunts Lodge of Installed Masters 3422. He is also a member of East and Central Africa Lodge 7446, a metropolitan lodge and is currently Chaplain and Mentor.

He was promoted to Past Provincial Grand Sword Bearer in 2023 and honoured with promotion to Provincial Grand Senior Warden in 2025.

He was exalted into the Royal Arch in 2009 and is currently a member of Paviours & City Livery Chapter 5646.

W.Bro Jeff was initiated into Eleanor Cross Lodge on 9 January 1976, progressing through to become WM in 1987. He was appointed as a Provincial Grand Steward in 1989 and became WM of Palmer Lodge of Provincial Grand Stewards in 2002.

He served for over 15 years

as Eleanor Cross Lodge Charity Steward, which led to him being appointed as Provincial Grand Charity Steward in 1992, a post he held until 2002, running a very successful Festival appeal.

As we are now at the beginning of the New Masonic Season and the lodge charity stewards are looking to raise funds for Provincial and registered local charities the best way you can support them and your lodge is by starting or renewing a monthly regular payment. At the March Provincial Grand Charity meeting VW Bro Tim Almond DPGM launched the High Intensity Focused Ultrasound (HIFU) prostate machine appeal



for Northampton General Hospital, asking the brethren of the Province to raise £20,000 within a very short period, but down to the hard work by

the lodge charity steward with the support of the brethren for a very worthwhile cause a massive £55,000 was raised.

Last November the Provincial Grand Master was asked by the Pro Grand Master to support six other Provinces in raising £100,000 each for the Maggie's Appeal, with only having a couple of months left the Province has raised so far, an outstanding £159,171.

Whilst raising monies for the two appeals the lodges have also raised the following: PGC £28,761 TLC £27,606 Three Pillars £12,418 Devonshire Court £10,630 Lifelites £2,697 Palmer Court £3,795 Non-Masonic Charities £66,973 Total £152,880

There are two MCF Grant applications waiting to be agreed totalling £120,000, at the present there are ten grants already being paid to

local charities and this makes a total of the MCF Grants within the Province to £259,835

It has been decided that the Lifelites charity being one of the Provincial Charities who have received tremendous support over a number of years, a more local charity should now get that support.

As from the 1st August 2025 the Northampton Young Carers based in Wellingborough will be one of the Provincial Charities. So please help your lodge charity steward make donations by having a regular payment.

After meeting with one of the founders of MAGPAS, Dr Neville Silverstone at a lake where they both go fishing and hearing about the vital work that MAGPAS does





within our County. W.Bro Richard Low decided to make MAGPAS his chosen charity during his year as Master and raised a fantastic £1500. W.Bro Sean Dennis the Lodge Charity Steward made an application to the Provincial Grand Charity for enhancement which added a further £1500. Every day MAGPAS saves lives across Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and the East of England. Each Air Ambulance flight cost on average £3500. MAGPAS receives no government funding and is totally funded by generous donations from Individuals, Businesses and charitable organisations which are essential to raise the £6 million per year it costs to provide this life saving care.

The new airbase at

Enterprise Campus, Alconbury Weald, Huntingdon has facilities for providing the Aircrews and Medical Staff with a kitchen, Restroom and sleeping

accommodation and along with a state of the art fully immersive training facility. MAGPAS operates their Air Ambulance helicopter from 7am to 7pm and has a 24hr road vehicle capability. The MAGPAS teams have been called out 34 times in one week which included incidents across the five counties and visited patients with medical emergencies of all different sorts. The Hinchingsbrooke Lodge is proud to have supported this life saving organisation.

Brethren, I hope you enjoyed the summer and are looking forward to the Masonic year ahead. It was a pleasure to see so many of you at the Building Together Roadshows, and I thank all Lodges and Groups for their efforts to address our Membership Challenge.

Sadly, the second half of last season saw some inertia, with higher-than-expected losses due to deaths outweighing gains. We are currently 14 down year-to-date, and this cannot continue. A Lodge losing three members in a season must aim for at least four new joiners or initiates to stay healthy. While some losses are inevitable, we must constantly balance numbers to avoid spiralling costs for fewer members.

The evidence is clear: Lodges and Groups that take a proactive approach to Attraction are seeing dramatic improvements. Discover Freemasonry events across the Province – using gazebos, marketing materials, and open days – have increased awareness, produced strong enquiries, and reinvigorated volunteers. A great example was Peterborough's Beer Festival



stand and Open Day, generating over 20 high-quality enquiries and strong momentum for the new season. Attraction systems are booked and supported through the Discover Freemasonry Events Calendar and Booking System on the Provincial Website - scan the QR Code to access this (you must log in too!).

A long-term public presence is vital, and reduced rates for equipment plus Provincial funding now make this easier. Gentlemen's Information Evenings, now inclusive of wives and partners, continue to provide

a strong finale to attraction activity.

Please ensure all enquiries are promptly logged on Hermes to allow us to support effectively. Together, through proactive attraction, retention, and streamlined joining, we can grow our Lodges and achieve our **"Next Step 3000"** target.

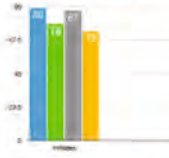

Brethren all, I hope you had a most enjoyable summer and are returning to the new Masonic Season refreshed and looking forward to whatever challenge your next role in Freemasonry provides you with. For those that were active in Lodges over the summer, I hope you had productive meetings and events.

The major message from our new framework of 'Building Together' is that Pure Antient Masonry is a four stage journey and consists of four ceremonies and that the journey is not complete until the ceremony of Exaltation into a Royal Arch Chapter.

However, from a mentoring and engagement point of view the Framework has somewhat changed and clarified a number of things. The first thing to note is that it is now part of Craft Engagement to facilitate the Brother to continue his journey in Pure Antient Masonry culminating in Exaltation into a Royal Arch Chapter. Not only does this benefit the Brother by

completing his journey and therefore discovering that which was lost, but statistics show that brethren who have completed their journey are less likely to leave Pure Antient Masonry.

This concept is shown in the Figure below which is an extract from the Building Together Hub.

Perhaps equally important as the "Continue your journey" element, is the identification of Brethren who are at risk of leaving. This now sits squarely in the Engage role within the Lodge, normally managed by the Lodge Mentor. If I were to ask in any Lodge "What are the signs that a brother is at risk of leaving?", I am sure that I would get several very good responses.

Yet we still have brethren who resign; therefore, we are missing an opportunity to prevent some resignations. The secret is to do something about those risks. In many respects consistent non attendance, for known reasons and provided those are understood, and the brother being regularly contacted can be considered as a managed situation. However, where we see

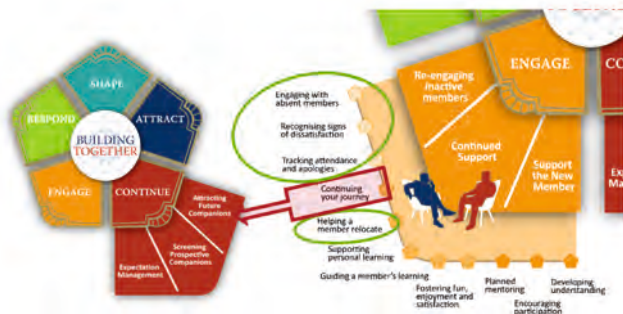
this indicates a potential risk and prompt action is required.

It is the case that some resignations are unavoidable for example an older, long serving, brother who decides to resign due to ill health can be understood, however there is a reasonable percentage of resignations which could be avoided. If we can reduce resignations by 20% across the year that would result in about 30 additional members and would greatly assist in us meeting the **Next Step 3000** target set by the PGM/MEGS.

Finally, brethren I would remind you all that this is a hobby and that hobbies must be enjoyable and fun. No one gets paid to come to Lodge, indeed membership of Freemasonry costs us money. You would not expect anyone to continue to pay for something which they do not enjoy. I would encourage you all to ensure that you and the Brethren of your Lodge enjoy their time and have fun. Masonic ceremonies are serious things and require appropriate deportment, however we can do it with a smile on our face and always emphasising that Freemasonry is Fun.

I wish you all a most enjoyable and productive Masonic season and look forward to meeting as many of you as I can in the months ahead.

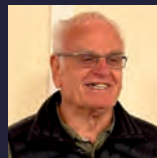

Thrapston's Graham Milton Lodge recently organised

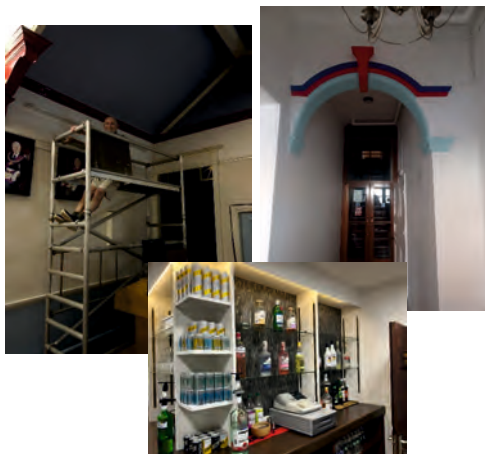

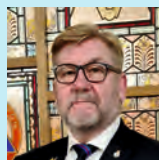

of being 'on the level' in a fellowship of men.

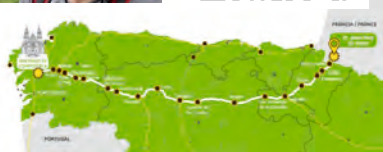
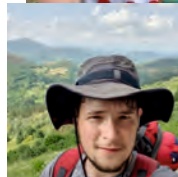
And among the many masons of a speculative mind,

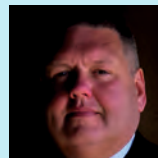

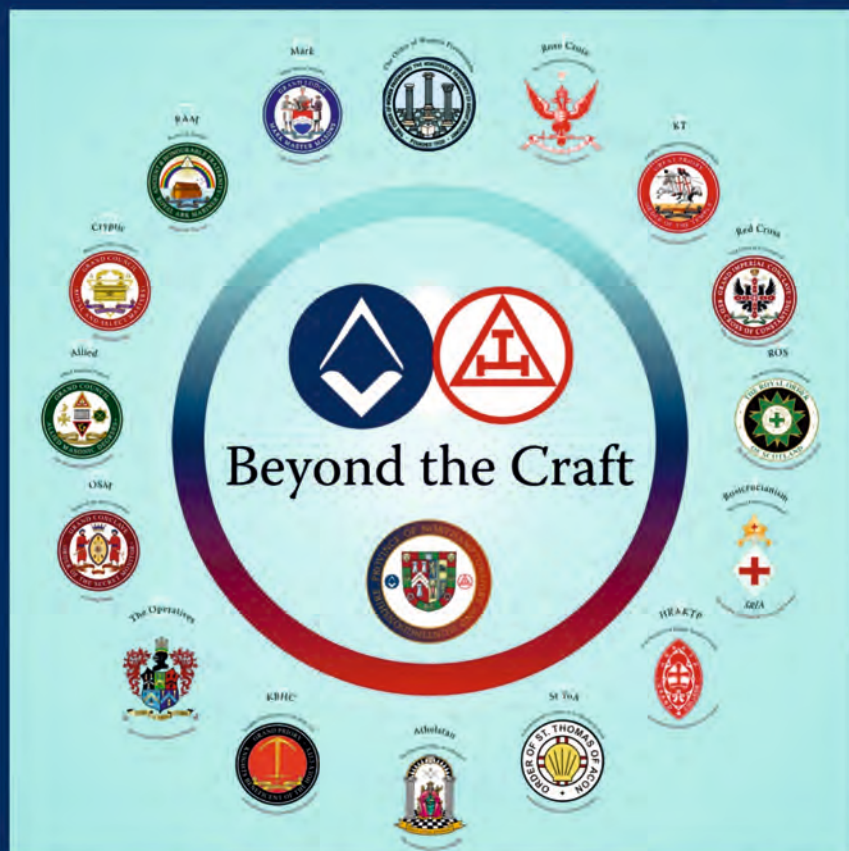
